

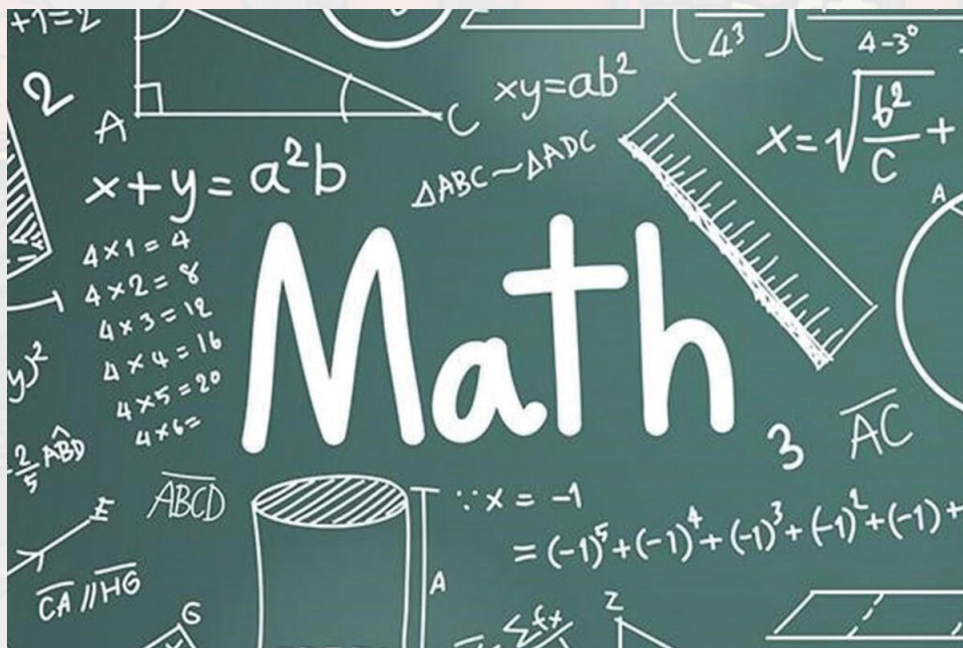

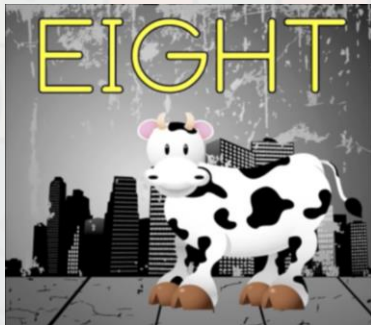

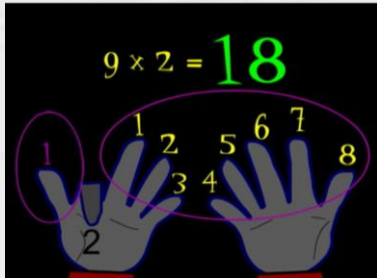

9's fact song

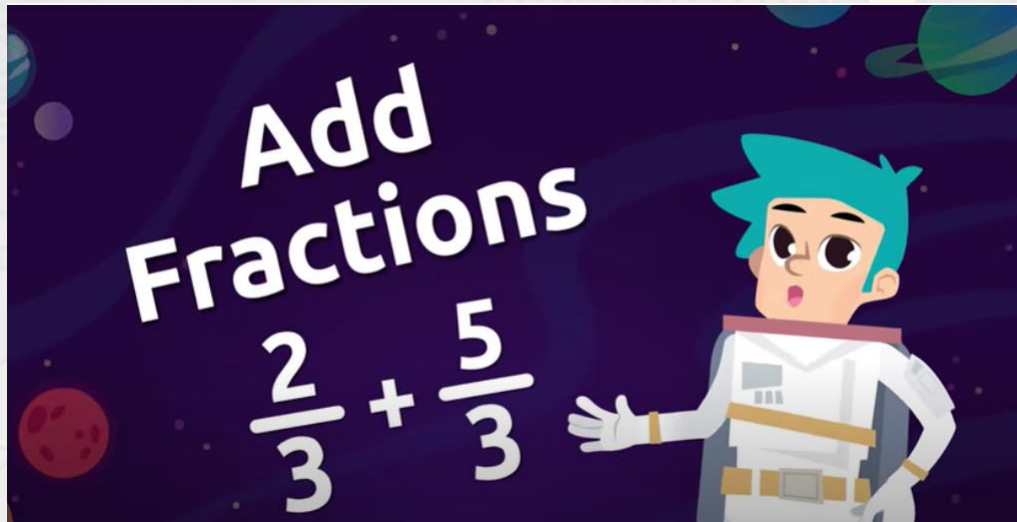

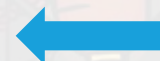


Humanism is not a religion. It is a philosophy or an approach to life. Humanists don't see any good evidence that a god or gods exist. They are therefore **atheists** (they don't believe in a god or gods) or they are **agnostics** (they believe we can never know if a god or gods exist).

Humanism, however, is more than just not believing in a god. Humanists also have many positive beliefs about how we can understand ourselves and the world, and how we should live our lives.



Read this



For me, the most important thing is not whether I believe in a god or not, but it is how I live my life. Humanists believe we can be good and happy without the need for gods or religion.

Many humanists like to ask and think through big questions of life.
